TEIGER FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES 2025 GRANTEES AND EXPANDED COMMITMENT TO U.S. CURATORS

\$7 million awarded to contemporary art curators across the U.S. as Foundation expands grants

New York, NY, August 27, 2025 — **Teiger Foundation**—the only U.S. foundation dedicated exclusively to supporting contemporary art curators—is pleased to announce its 2025 grantees. In its **largest grantmaking cycle to date**, the Foundation awards **\$7 million** to **85 curators** working at institutions of all sizes across the United States and Puerto Rico.

Teiger Foundation's grant program continues to support U.S. curators at organizations of all sizes to conduct research, mount exhibitions, and host touring shows; and curators at organizations with budgets of \$3.5 million and below to realize three years of programming. Grant amounts range from \$50,000 to \$150,000.

This year's grantees reflect Teiger Foundation's commitment to extending its support beyond traditional art centers. From rural Mississippi and Appalachia to Hawai'i and Puerto Rico, curators are engaging with the distinct environmental, political, and cultural contexts of their communities. In light of this, the Foundation embraces geography as a lens to amplify diverse perspectives, reinforcing its dedication to locally grounded, thoughtful work nationwide.

In addition to supporting curators at large institutions like the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles; Detroit Institute of Arts, Detroit; Walker Art Center, Minneapolis; and Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, Richmond, Teiger is funding significant projects at small and mid-sized organizations such as 516 ARTS in Albuquerque, BOFFO on Fire Island, Pu'uhonua Society in Honolulu, The Renaissance Society in Chicago, and Arts Foundation of Kosciusko in Mississippi.

This year's grantees reflect the remarkable scope of curatorial innovation across the U.S., with projects that stage landmark surveys of pioneering artists; activate regional, queer and diasporic cultural networks; foreground ecological histories and environmental justice; or revitalize overlooked archives and artistic lineages. Together, these initiatives illuminate how curators are reshaping contemporary art's relationship to place, history, and community. Select 2025 grantees include:

Single Projects

- Theresa Hak Kyung Cha: Multiple Offerings at the Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive, CA, the first retrospective of the artist in over 20 years. Curated by Victoria Sung with Tausif Noor, the exhibition will present Cha's most comprehensive body of work to date, including pieces never before shown publicly, focusing on her explorations of language, memory, and diasporic identity.
- L.V. Hull, the first major survey of the visionary artist and cultural leader, organized by the Arts Foundation of Kosciusko, MS. Curated by Ryan N. Dennis, Annalise Flynn, and Yaphet Smith, the exhibition spotlights Hull's vibrant found-object environments and legacy in her hometown. It will be presented concurrently at the L.V. Hull Home & Legacy Center and the Mississippi Museum of Art.
- Rodney McMillian: A Son of the Soil at the Columbia Museum of Art, SC, the artist's largest U.S. museum show and first solo exhibition in the Southeast. Curated by Michael Neumeister, it surveys McMillian's work across painting, sculpture, and film, highlighting his sustained engagement with land, labor, and history. McMillian grew up just blocks from the South Carolina statehouse in Columbia, where the Confederate flag flew until 2015.
- Afterlives: Japanese American Artists and the Postwar Era at MOCA Los Angeles,
 CA, curated by Clara Kim and Kris Kuramitsu, explores the creative legacy of artists,
 architects, and photographers affected by Executive Order 9066. Featuring around 200
 works, the show highlights figures such as Ruth Asawa, George Nakashima, Miyoko Ito,
 and Isamu Noguchi, framing their post-incarceration work as acts of survival, resistance,
 and resilience—alongside contemporary artists including Kelly Akashi, Leonor Antunes,
 David Horvitz, Glenn Kaino, Ken Okiishi, and Bruce Yonemoto.

Three Years of Programming

 Acadiana Center for the Arts in Lafayette, LA, led by Jaik Faulk, will present exhibitions, performances, and publications rooted in southern Louisiana's cultural specificity. The program will highlight intergenerational artists and collectives reflecting the region's resilient, self-sustaining creative ecology. Upcoming exhibitions include a 30-year survey of Kathy Reed and Steve Breaux's collaborative practice; a major exhibition on the Lafayette-based collective The Artists' Alliance (1986–1998); and a landscape-focused tribute to Elemore Morgan, who taught painting and drawing at the University of Southwestern Louisiana for three decades and influenced generations of local artists.

- Museo de Arte Contemporáneo de Puerto Rico in San Juan, PR, will present exhibitions curated by Marina Reyes Franco, Abdiel D. Segarra Ríos, and Alexandra Méndez. exploring diasporic abstraction, food politics, and overlooked local conceptual art legacies. Exhibitions include *Trópico Agridulce*, an exhibition exploring the politics of food in the Caribbean; *Diasporican Abstraction: Identity Beyond Representation*, featuring artists like Olga Albizu, Gisela Colón, Zilia Sánchez, and Edra Soto; and a solo exhibition of work by Puerto Rican sculptor and printmaker Antonio Navia.
- CCA Wattis Institute for Contemporary Arts in San Francisco, CA is entering a new chapter of site-responsive programming following its move to California College of the Arts' unified campus. Led by Daisy Nam, Jeanne Gerrity, and Diego Villalobos, new initiatives include Venue, an outdoor commissioning series debuting with a performance by Jeremy Toussaint-Baptiste, followed by projects from Justin Caguiat, Rafael Delacruz, and Lotus L. Kang. A research season will activate the galleries through installations and public programs exploring labor and rest, while the Wattis residency relaunches with CFGNY.
- Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop at EFA in New York will launch Global Impressions, a three-year series of exhibitions, commissions, and programs organized by Essye Klempner and Jazmine Catasús that trace the international legacy of the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop. Projects include retrospectives of Mohammad Omer Khalil and the Asilah Cultural Moussem, exhibitions on Caribbean and anti-apartheid networks, and new print portfolios by Shadi Harouni, Kameelah Janan Rasheed, and Nyugen E. Smith.

Hosting

- The Industry in Los Angeles, CA, under Malik Gaines and Tim Griffin, will stage Sable Elyse Smith: If you unfolded us, a multimedia opera originally commissioned by MoMA. Reimagined in a nightclub setting for her hometown, the immersive work explores a love story between two Black women and will be accompanied by citywide public programs.
- Frye Art Museum in Seattle, WA, will host An Indigenous Present, curated by Jeffrey Gibson and Jenelle Porter for ICA Boston, organized at the Frye by Georgia Erger. Expanding on the landmark 2023 publication, the exhibition explores abstraction in the work of contemporary North American Indigenous artists, including Caroline Monnet, Sonya Kelliher-Combs, Dakota Mace, and Kay Walkingstick, among others. It will be

paired with a presentation of Northwest Indigenous contemporary art organized by the Frye.

Luckman Fine Arts Complex at Cal State Los Angeles, CA, will host Millie Wilson: The
Museum of Lesbian Dreams, the first retrospective of the underrecognized LA-artist.
Organized by David Evans Frantz and Amy L. Powell (Krannert Art Museum) and led
locally by Aaron Gomez, this homecoming exhibition surveys Wilson's queer feminist
photo-based installations and will feature a full-scale presentation of Fauve Semblant:
Peter (A Young English Girl).

Research

- Valerie Cassel Oliver at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts in Richmond, VA, will
 conduct new research to organize Al Loving: Folding Geometries, a major retrospective
 tracing Loving's evolution from hard-edge abstraction to his iconic torn canvases and
 later constructions.
- **Blank Forms** in Brooklyn, NY, led by **Lawrence Kumpf**, will continue major research on the life and work of Catherine Christer Hennix (1948–2023). Drawing from her archive, the project will explore Hennix's impact on minimalism, mysticism, mathematics, and experimental music, culminating in a series of public programs in 2027.
- Alisa Polischuk at Creativity Explored in San Francisco, CA, will develop a free online resource establishing best practices for curating and collaborating with artists with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD).

Beginning in 2025, Teiger Foundation will shift its Call for Proposals to a biennial cycle, allowing for a deeper investment in its grantees through extended programmatic support and creating space to expand grant opportunities in future cycles. In preparation for this strategic shift, this year the Foundation has nearly doubled the grant amount compared to its previous cycle of \$3.9 million in 2024.

Teiger will also expand its unique Hosting grant—the only program of its kind supporting traveling exhibitions—to a quarterly cycle. This increased frequency will create more opportunities for curatorial collaboration, deepen research on key themes and artists, and bring important exhibitions to new audiences, adapting them to local contexts in meaningful ways while extending their life-span.

ABOUT TEIGER FOUNDATION

Teiger Foundation advances innovative curatorial practice in contemporary art. Through its grantmaking initiatives, Teiger Foundation aims to catalyze positive change within the field through its support of curatorial projects that further new research, broaden opportunities for diversity and inclusion, and embrace more sustainable practices.

Established by collector and art patron David Teiger (1929–2014) in 2008, the Foundation honors the spirit of its late founder who acted as an advocate for contemporary curators pursuing ambitious, innovative, and unconventional projects. The Foundation moved into a new phase of activity following the posthumous sale of Teiger's collection in 2018–19. Between 2020 and 2022, the Foundation distributed a total of \$8 million, supporting artistic leadership and curators at nonprofit institutions; curator-led coalitions and initiatives that support and challenge the field of visual art; as well as COVID relief efforts that helped artists and cultural workers in need. 2023 brought the Foundation's first Call for Proposals and climate action pilot, both of which have now become central programs of the Foundation's grant-giving and support efforts.
